Principal Panel Update

Staffing Update

This term has presented many challenges to our staffing model at Mount Gambier High School. Sadly, Jade Lock, our Junior School Assistant Principal has needed to take leave, which will continue through to the end of the term. As her tenure concludes at the end of term 2, she will not be returning to Mount Gambier High School. Her expertise, energy and enthusiasm as a leader will be sorely missed.

Other staffing news this term includes:

- Kerran Wingard has won the Junior School Assistant Principal for the remainder of this term.
- Abbey Duncan has won the Special Sports Coordinator role for the remainder of this term, through to the end of term 3.
- Jess Kennedy has won the Timetabling position for the remainder of the year.
- Nicolle Orr is adding the year 9 cohort into her Year Level Manager role. She will now be responsible for year level management of both our year 10 and year 9 cohorts.
- We have all teaching placements into staffing for 2022 to cover exiting staff and the predicted requirements of middle school teachers needed for next year.
- Leadership positions for 2022 are still being finalised with external advertising required.

Year 7 to High School Transition School Visits

Members of our Junior School Management Team have spent time over recent weeks visiting our local primary schools to share what it is to be a high school student. External School Review

Our External School Review will be conducted during term 4 this year. The main directions for our shared focus have been:

Direction 1—Ensure school goals are achieved through methodical implementation of systems that build the capacity of teachers, SSOs and leaders to implement agreed actions.

Direction 2—Better meet the learning needs of all students by building the capacity of teachers and leaders to analyse, understand and respond to data to inform more intentional, differentiated planning.

Direction 3—Motivate greater student engagement through the collective development of an agreed, evidence-based pedagogical approach and establishing systematic scaffolds that enable teachers to consistently implement expected practice.

All three directions are presently being analysed by all sectors of our school community in preparation for this review.

Pupil Free Day: Entrepreneurial Specialist School (ESS)

System reviews, conversations and planning continue to grow and develop around how our entrepreneurial approaches can look as we push forward in this exciting program. Our team consisting of Josh Praolini and Jess Magarey have been working with the ongoing support of Flinders University and the department to design and construct a stream of specialist classes in years 8 to 10.

Our recent Pupil Free Day allowed all staff to further explore entrepreneurial thinking skills and planning for the classroom.

The work of every teacher at Mount Gambier High School to explore how curiosity, problem solving, teamwork and real world connections can flourish in existing subjects has also been an exciting journey over the last few terms.

School Expectations and Reminders

We began the school year with a rigorous and relentless approach to reminders, high expectations and follow up to supporting a positive change in culture.

This included:

- Zero tolerance to any physical violence on and off our site

- Actioning recent mobile phone policy and headphones use in classrooms and learning opportunities
- The importance of attendance to class and engaging fully in learning
- Wearing clothes that align with the school's Dress Code Policy
- Being respectful and mindful of using appropriate language towards others.

I continue to ask all parents for support in these expectations so that we can continue to effect successful cultural shift at our school.


Reminders

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SPACE WORK EXPERIENCE



As the excitement around South Australia's space sector continues to skyrocket, South Australian students are being provided the opportunity to gain experience in the burgeoning industry through the South Australian Space Industry Centre (SASIC) and Advanced Technology Program (ATP) Space Industry Work Experience Program managed within the Department for Education. Students are able to learn from an experienced mentor and explore the exciting career opportunities available across the space industry.

"Students get the chance to get real world experience alongside mentors, developing STEM skills for a rapidly growing space industry in SA. The opportunities to be a part of an up and coming contributor to the state's economy in the space industry are endless for our young

people," Department for Education Program Manager Dr Sarah Baker said.

Over the April school holidays, Mount Gambier High School year 11 student, Laryssa King was selected to take part in this exciting opportunity, which launched as a pilot program in 2019. Late last year, Laryssa submitted an application for the program, which puts students aged 15 years and older in a short-term placement at a South Australian space organisation and was one of 22 shortlisted students from 162 applications. The placement led by Dr Paulo Santos, Lecturer in Artificial Intelligence and Robotics, focused on developing skills important for future Space Industry missions including robotics, CAD and programming. Over the three days of work experience within the College of Science and Engineering at Flinders University, Tonsley, Laryssa joined with a small group of students on the "Design and 3D Printing of a platform for a humanoid robot to execute "controlled falls" project.

"Over the three days at Tonsley I was working on a walking aid for the Flinders robot, which is a part of their robot soccer team. My group decided to design a walking aid based on the walkers for babies that were free standing and able to move in any direction. We started by sketching our ideas, measuring the robot and then used Autodesk Inventor to turn our sketches into a full 3d-model," said Laryssa.

Laryssa also had the opportunity to tour the Advanced Manufacturing and Innovation Research groups and industries based at the College of Science and Engineering, which are helping to build skills, materials and products utilised widely across the Australian Space and Defence Industries.

Laryssa highly valued this unique work experience and hopes to continue developing innovation and STEM skills throughout her learning at Mount Gambier High School, with the possibility of moving into the space industry through traineeship opportunities in the future.
