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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

To our School Community

I find it amazing how quickly this semester has gone! At the same time, upon reflection of what has been successfully achieved in this short time, I am even more amazed. I would like to take this opportunity to thank and congratulate all staff at Mount Gambier High School for their ongoing efforts and high standards of professionalism throughout this time. As a team we have been highly successful in our continued realigning of expectations and standards at our school and the strategic planning and development required for next years introduction of Year 7s to high school, a new timetable format, development of middle schooling pedagogy and preparation of occupancy into new buildings.

In particular, I acknowledge the tremendous work put in by our Year 7 to High School Reference Group, initially led by Jade Lock and Kerran Wingard and more recently Kerran Wingard and Jess Magarey. Many staff members are in this group and have collectively contributed to highly successful Twilight Tours of the school, information evenings, organising Principal Tours, visiting Primary Schools, surveying prospective Year 7 students on their needs, influencing change in timetable structure and the development of Middle Schooling pedagogy and practices in readiness for 2022.

I also acknowledge the outstanding work of our Timetable Restructure Team led by chairperson Josh Praolini and made up of representative staff members from all sectors of our school site. This team has been highly strategic in its planning and consultation, developing a new timetable structure in readiness for 2022. Josh has further highlighted work done by this group in this newsletter.

I thank our Business Manager, Steph McIntosh who has played a significant role in overseeing the construction and re-development of buildings at our site over the last year and a half. She has collaborated with Kennett Builders and various department agencies throughout this time to ensure this multi-million dollar development is kept to schedule and posing as least impact on teaching and learning as possible.

Principal Position Update

In recent weeks, a selection panel for the principal's position at Mount Gambier High School over the next 4 ½ years was held. The panel, chaired by Adam Box, Educational Director of Mount Gambier 1- Blue Lake made it clear that, "Only the right person for this position would be chosen". The panel did not find a suitable applicant for the position and ultimately their decision of "No successful applicant" was in the best interests for our school.

A new principal panel will be formed as soon as possible in term 3. The Department for Education has ensured that maximum advertising for this position at both state and national levels will occur. This will, where possible, include incentives to attract the quality principal Mount Gambier High School requires to further enhance its vision and direction.

In the interim, through negotiation with Adam, I have agreed to continue my role as principal in term 3 for consistency whilst the process continues to appoint a principal from term 4, 2021.

Andy Thomas Space Foundation Challenge

Recently, The Andy Thomas Space Foundation presented a challenge to all schools in South Australia to submit an application involving students and teachers in years 7, 8 or 9 on the importance of space in addressing the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

Two staff members, Emma Robinson and Danny Ashcroft submitted individual applications: "Blue Lake and Beyond" - Students will work in teams to consider how drone technology, GPS and satellites could be used to assist in the management of the Blue Lake, to ensure there is water for generations to come, 'Pygmy Perch Restoration Program' - This project will be the first step in restoring a population of a native species of fish that since 2000 has been listed as threatened by the Australian Society for Fish Biology.

We are proud to announce that Danny was one of the nine successful submissions (25 received from across the State) to receive a \$5,000 grant to support his Pigmy Perch project. Emma was highly praised for her application, but under the rules of the panel, only one successful submission is allowed per school.

For both submissions we will be looking at opportunities through our Entrepreneurial Specialist School focus as to how we can engage with Flinders University and obtain resources to support both of these worthy projects.

Recent Events

In recent weeks I have had the opportunity of attending various school events including:

- The Year 9/10 Music Advanced Class 'Music Extravaganza'. This was an outstanding performance organised and event managed by the students using entrepreneurial thinking skills and planning. I congratulate all students on the part that they played in entertaining a large audience in our Performing Arts Theatre.
- The Year 8/9 Science and Engineering Challenge was an great opportunity to see our year 8 and 9 students presented with challenges that required high level problem solving skills, teamwork and engineering capabilities. I thank Sam Brown and Karen Jared for the invitation and congratulate the students involved in this very successful program.

Finally, I congratulate students on their efforts in Semester 1, whether it be continual assessment tasks throughout the semester or exams at senior level at the end of the semester. Student reports will indicate performance and certainly provide some kind of indication of what is required in semester 2.

2022 TIMETABLE STRUCTURE

Mount Gambier High School has begun some big changes ahead of 2022. The first is revamping the timetable structure (supplied below). The new timetable will reduce subjects in a semester from seven to six.

The main drive for this change is to support our students with their learning. The shift will result in an extra ten hours per subject across the year in classrooms, allowing students more time with their teachers. The new timetable is well designed to assist the middle schooling approach that the school will be moving to in 2022, to support the learning of the year 7 and 8 students. It will also allow students to focus their learning, resulting in a reduced overall workload and allowing for more time to deepen their learning, rather than spreading it thin.

The school day will be structured differently, with more break times allocated, allowing students to move and interact outside of classrooms between lessons. Having three 80 minute lessons per week means there are more opportunity for practical subjects, without the 45 minute single lessons.

Finally, this move will bring us into line with Grant High School's timetable. This will allow greater subject collaboration between the two high schools. This is especially important for specialist subjects in the senior years as often these do not get enough enrolments to run. Being able to work between the two high schools means a greater selection of subjects for our region's youth. Earlier this year we surveyed the student body to find out what is important to them and now we are finding creative ways to address the results of the survey.

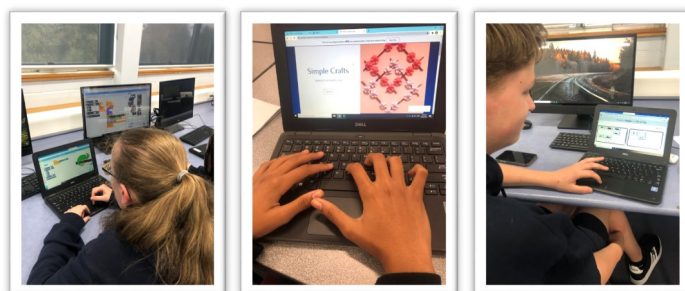

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES FUN



During the first semester students from years 8 and 9 were given the opportunity to explore a number of areas relating to Digital Technologies under the Australian Curriculum. The students enjoyed their hands on time in the digital classroom completing amazing and creative projects and activities.

As an introduction to Digital Technologies, and incorporating the safe use of hardware and software when students are online, we worked through a unit of work that allowed students to become aware of the dangers when online. This unit gave students important tools and allowed them to become aware of how to identify scammers, fraudulent activities and how to stay safe when chatting to others via games or chat rooms. Students were also made aware of how addicted they are to electronic devices both in the home and in the community.

Other topics that we focused upon were: Networks both LAN (Local Area Network) and WAN (Wide Area Network). Students setup via an online simulation a home and business network. They were able to test these networks and find points where data was slowing down. Thus, rearranging or using higher specification hardware students were able to eliminate all problems in the network.

Students created some amazing and well-planned websites that could be used for blogging or as online stores. All students were given the opportunity to create a simple application or game by using the Scratch environment.

Year 9 students went on to experiment with Artificial Intelligence. While training the computers to think and understand for themselves, students became aware of how AI has become a part of our everyday lives. Students were able to train computers to identify faces, colours, shapes and activities. The computers, via recognising the students faces, were then able to make suggestions and offer certain activities to individual students.

YEAR 9 CAREER EXPLORATION DAY



On Monday 7 June, year 9 students from Mount Gambier High School participated in a Career Exploration Day at the school. A number of industry representatives were invited to facilitate Q & A panels, presentations and workshops to showcase the many career pathways available in the Limestone Coast.

The Career Exploration Day was designed by Elisa Crispino, Mount Gambier High School Vocational Pathways Coordinator, to help students discover, develop and drive their career planning.

Lance Pedlow from the Regional Development Board, started the day with a presentation about jobs in the area and career pathways currently trending. Students then sectioned off into smaller groups to participate in industry specific practical workshops and information sessions held by industry professionals such as Senior Constable, Jade Hill (Police), Madeleine Brookes (Tourism and Events), Luke Norman (Plumbing), Sergio Crispino (Electrical), Scott Cram (Primary Industry), Ashlee Kalantarain (Creative Design) and Don Pratt (Hospitality). A number of students also travelled off site during the day to experience workshops at Carlin and Gazzard, TAFE SA Automotive and The Bay Pizzeria. Employability and enterprise skills were highlighted by all presenters with common understanding that communication, literacy and numeracy, are essential in any career pathway.

"Mount Gambier High School is appreciative of the time that each of the industry representatives spent contributing to the day. It was a unique opportunity for our students to learn more about their strengths and abilities, while exploring potential career options - giving them the confidence to start taking control of their future. As we look forward to 2022, students will have options of selecting Flexible Industry Pathways which will offer more industry tours, emersions and explorations as part their continuing education," said Elisa Crispino.

The aim of the day was to encourage students to participate in activities that would develop their teamwork, communication, problem solving, designing, creativity and engineering skills.

The activities involved designing and building a catapult and a bionic hand using simple materials provided to them within a given time frame. Once built, the students then had to put their creations to the test which were scrutinised by our resident judge, Dr Jim O'Hehir from Lakes Rotary Club and UniSA.

Competition across both challenges was tight, with students showing the most success in using their bionic hands. The catapult proved to be a little more challenging, when trying to achieve accuracy not just distance.

After running out of time on the day, the students came back for the presentation of certificates and the announcement of the inaugural winner of the trophy. Dr Jim O'Hehir and Principal, Peter McLaren kindly joined us for the presentations. Our runners up for 2021 were Chen Yue and Luka Andrews-Lijevec and our winners were team 'Mr Makers' including; Ruby Davis, Belle Hooper, Lucky Raful and Harry Martin.

Year 9 and 10 students from Mount Gambier and the surrounding region will be visiting Mount Gambier High School on 29 and 30 June to attend the Flinders University Regional Roadshow and STEM Showcase for two days of fun, practical and informative workshops across a range of study areas. Students will receive a taste of university and engage with our academics whilst exploring some of the exciting opportunities available to them in the future.

The intention of the program is to light the spark of interest in our regional youth and overcome the 'you can't be what you can't see' dilemma.

Over the two days, 150 Mount Gambier High School year 9 and 10 students will be participating and have the opportunity to get up close and personal with exciting opportunities which could become their future careers. Activities include programming and use of robots, understanding the forensics of food science, simulated blood typing to solve crimes, code cracking, human rights and the law, business and business in society, creative arts, medicine and paramedics and more.

The program concludes with a half day Teacher Professional Development day on Thursday 1 July, delivered by the Flinders University College of Science and Engineering, focused on supporting STEM Teachers to increase student engagement in the classroom and build a love of STEM in our learners, to better prepare for the future.

Important notes for canteen orders

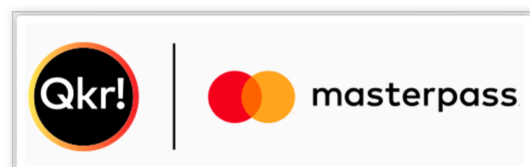
