CANMASTER SMASH




Students enjoyed entertaining workshop presented by Canmaster Smash, who uses recycled materials as drum and percussion instruments. What we think of as rubbish buckets, metal scraps, old pots and pans - Canmaster Smash collects and turns into a crazy, jumbled-up drum set. As he performed to students, he demonstrated a range of styles from rock to



OLIPHANT SCIENCE AWARDS



MOUNT GAMBIER HIGH SCHOOL

From the start of 2022 Mount Gambier High School will have a new compulsory uniform. Governing Council have approved a Uniform Policy that will replace the current Dress Code policy. All new students to Mount Gambier High School will be required to wear the exclusively supplied Lowes uniform from the start of 2022.

Cash/envelope ordering

If ordering for more than one child, payment should be enclosed in the envelope of the eldest child and this should be indicated on the envelope of the other child/children (the envelope that does not have cash enclosed).

STEP 2

Enclose exact cash payment in one envelope for the package/s you are ordering. Payment for more than one child should be in the eldest child's envelope and marked at the bottom of the envelope in the space provided.

STEP 3

Return your completed envelope/s, with correct cash payment, to our photographers on the day.

Uniform Policy

School Context

Mount Gambier High School (MGHS) is a proud public school: we are a comprehensive, coeducational, multicultural year 7 to 12 school in South Australia's largest regional city and are part of the Blue Lake Partnership. Our school has approximately 750 students. Our school is committed to providing relevant and individualised learning programs for students, aligned with both the expectations of the Australian Curriculum and Entrepreneurial thinking to achieve academic success. Our Mission, Vision and Values reflect a commitment to global understandings, entrepreneurial mindedness and intercultural understandings to create a rich learning environment.

School Vision

Mount Gambier High School students practise skills and gain confidence to successfully face the challenges of an ever-changing world in an environment that values a sense of learning, innovation and agile thinking.

Mission Statement

Our staff are purposeful, engaging and inclusive. Our students participate with effort and pride and our community celebrates diversity and thrives on collaboration.

All students wear full school uniform. It promotes pride in presentation, supports equity principles and allows staff to provide care to students who are immediately recognisable as Mount Gambier High School students. This decision has been ratified by the Governing Council.

Preface

Mount Gambier High School uniforms are provided by Lowes Australia and are available for purchase through the Mount Gambier store (located in the Marketplace shopping centre). Lowes Australia offer a number of incentives to both parents/caregivers and the school including:

- As a family-owned business, Lowes is part of a small, but elite group of companies, which have been in business for 120 years and still 100% Australian owned.

- Lowes ZERO CARD; 5% discount on every purchase, 5% in Rewards Points, take home layby (with monthly repayments managed by Lowes)
- School receives 5% of annual net sales (ex. GST).



All members of the school community work in partnership to support students in the wearing of the school uniform.

A student shall wear the full and correct school uniform when on school grounds, travelling to and from the school and at all school organised activities unless informed otherwise by the staff member(s) responsible for the activity.

Parents and caregivers are encouraged to contact the school if provision of uniform causes financial hardship. For cultural and medical exemptions that apply to any part of the uniform, please refer to the section within the policy titled "Exemptions to Aspects of the Uniform Policy".

The school colours are navy, gold and white.

Footwear

Black shoes or sports shoes (WHS requires all footwear to be enclosed toe).

Senior Students (Year 12)

Year 12 students are permitted to wear the Senior Rugby top supplied by Lowes Australia, which has been approved by the Governing Council. The Rugby top is woolblend, navy blue with white and gold horizontal stripes and screen printed with 'Seniors' across the back shoulders. Students will be able to add their name and year to their Senior Rugby Top.

Jewellery and Make up

- Discrete jewellery that ensures the personal safety of our students is acceptable.
- Hair dyed an unnatural colour is discouraged as we are preparing students for professional expectations.
- Discrete make up and nail polish are acceptable.

Protective Clothing

We provide a safe learning environment in line with the safety guidelines specified by the Department for Education, Department of industry and the Work Health Safety Act. Guidelines regarding clothing, footwear and eye protection are explained to students attending practical courses.

Mount Gambier High School acknowledges that excessive exposure to the sun can cause irreparable and potentially life threatening damage to the skin, eyes and other bodily tissues. For this reason Mount Gambier High School has included a hat in the school uniform.

Students are encouraged to wear the school uniform hat when outdoors and in particular when participating in outdoor sports for PE and School Sport. Sunscreen will be made available to students by their Health and Physical Education (HPE) teacher and students are encouraged to wear it throughout the day.

Within buildings, hats are to be removed.

Request for change to the School Uniform

Any request to change the school uniform, including the way in which it is worn by students, must be made in writing to the Principal of Mount Gambier High School or the Chairperson of the Uniform Committee, or by tabling proposed changes at a meeting of the Uniform Committee. The request will be discussed by the Uniform Committee and if justified, tabled at the Governing Council meeting. If the Governing Council also consider the request to be justified, then consultation will be undertaken by the Uniform Committee with all parties affected by the change, such as students, parents/caregivers, staff of the school and external authorities or bodies. Once the consultation process is complete the Uniform Committee will advise the Governing Council of its deliberations concerning the request. If the Governing Council is satisfied with the advice of the Uniform Committee, it will make a decision on the request. If a change is approved, the Governing Council will advise the school community in writing and endeavour to provide at least six months' notice of an intention to change the uniform. If the request is denied, the Governing Council will advise the petitioner in writing of the decision.

Exemptions to aspects of the Uniform Policy

The Principal may exempt a student from aspects of the uniform policy upon receipt of a written request from the parent or caregiver. The Principal will give due consideration to the request for an exemption. In making the decision, the Principal will have due regard for issues of culture and ethnicity, religion, financial hardship, genuine medical circumstances and/or other additional circumstances that the Governing Council may determine from time to time

If the decision is not to grant an exemption, the parent will be advised in writing of the decision. If the parent remains dissatisfied with the decision, they should seek clarification from the Principal.

Exceptions to wearing the school uniform

Sports Day

Students participating in Sports Day are permitted to wear:

- a sun safe house colour T-Shirt or Polo Top that has short or long sleeves
- house coloured accessories

House colours are Red (Mount), Blue (Lake), Black (Tower) and Yellow (Gambier). Students will be advised which house they belong to soon after joining the school.

An acceptable standard of dress applies to Sports Day (that is, bare mid-riffs or revealing clothing is unacceptable).

Special Sports Programs

Students are permitted to wear their allocated Special Sports Program uniform during Special Sports lessons and competitions.

Special Trip/Event Jumpers

Jumpers purchased specifically for school related trips or events (Italy and Canberra trips, musical performances, pedal prix etc.) are able to be worn as part of the standard Mount Gambier High School uniform.

Non-compliance with the Mount Gambier High School Uniform Policy

Non-compliance with the Mount Gambier High School Uniform Policy will be dealt with by the Principal or their nominee, and will involve strategies such as positive reinforcement, advice on responsible behaviour, provision of temporary clothing, private dialogue with the student and the parent(s)/caregiver(s) involved, verbal and/or written warning(s), physical exclusion zones, extra duties, detention, not participating in extracurricular activities.
