#### Arts Showcase

Recently I had the privilege of attending the Mount Gambier High School Arts Showcase at the Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre. This was an outstanding evening where the



exceptional individual and group talents of our students were highlighted. Whilst the production was outstanding, I began to reflect on just what this event has highlighted to me as principal of this school. Firstly, the courage shown by many of our students to simply get on stage and perform. Some of these students have experienced learning difficulties or even difficulties in their lives yet they demonstrated the resilience to get up and have a go and were rewarded for this in no uncertain terms by the audience. The learning of music lyrics, coordination of dance moves, experiencing the rigors of practice and constant rehearsals, working collaboratively with other students, all of which requires self-discipline and again resiliency, critical and creative thinking, and risk taking. These skills and dispositions that they have exhibited encompass true learning and we must remember that real and authentic learning comes from a variety of experiences many of which are not in the classroom but can be drawn upon in our daily teaching, and this was just one of them.

I congratulate you all. Thank you to the teachers behind the scenes as well, with a special mention to Trish Jenkins who was instrumental in ensuring the night was the success that it was. Thank you also to the staff, students, parents/caregivers and other community members who supported the students on the night.

Examples of student successes will be highlighted throughout this newsletter as well as in previous ones, yet we must acknowledge that these experiences simply do not happen without the support of the teachers, support staff and the parents/caregivers and I would like to thank those individuals who have supported our students to date participating in various extra-curricular activities and providing unique learning opportunities that our students have engaged in. I certainly look forward to the many challenges and successes that we will no doubt experience for the remainder of the year.

#### Student Behaviour Support Policy

We have begun the trial of our newly revised Behaviour Support processes with our year 9 students this week. 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## JAPANESE KENDO

The students then practiced using sword striking 'Men' (head) and 'Kote' (wrist) before progressing to striking 'Men' consecutively five times. 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## YEAR 8 CAVING EXCURSION

During week 6 some of our Year 8 Global Perspectives classes were fortunate to undertake a field report of the Naracoorte Caves as part of this term's Landscapes and Landforms unit. The students participated in a walking tour of the Alexandra Cave to observe some of the formations including straws, stalactites and stalagmites, pillars and columns. They also learnt about how caves are dated and formed, what fossils have been found in the caves and how this area gained its World Heritage listing. Students also challenged themselves through an introduction to Adventure Caving in the Stick-Tomato Cave, crawling and squeezing through challenges such as the keyhole and horseshoe.

# YEAR 11/12 GRAMPIANS CAMPS

In week 4 the Stage 2 Outdoor Education classes combined to conduct their Bushwalking and Rock Climbing Camp. This involved a 25 metre abseil, which tested a lot of nerves and a 12.5km hike that unfortunately had to be cut short due to very wet weather. During the walk the students reached the top of Mt Stapylton and then were hit with torrential rain. Thankfully we could eat lunch in the shelter of a cave, however the rain made for a very slow and dangerous descent, with some hilarious and memorable slides down the slippery sandstone. We also visited some Indigenous Rock Art and learnt a lot about Gariwerd (The Grampians) and the historical importance of the area. It was great to see the students support each other during the hike and climbing.

The following week the Stage 1 Outdoor Education class travelled to the Grampians for a three day bushwalking and rock climbing camp. They trekked up Mt Abrupt near Dunkeld and completed the Wonderland Loop near Halls Gap. It was fantastic to see the group develop their camp craft skills and cook impressive meals on the Trangia such as nachos, fried rice, bacon and eggs, and croissants. They worked well as a group by encouraging each other to complete the walk despite the drizzly weather and limited view at the Pinnacle. Rock Climbing and Abseiling at Hollow Mountain were also a highlight, with students extending their comfort zones and assisting each other to complete the 25 metre abseil and climbs.
