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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome back to term three. This term has seen the implementation of two key policies at Mount Gambier High School. Firstly, the Mobile Phone Policy which now requires no student access to phones and smart devices during the school day.

I would like to thank the students and staff for their proactive approach in regard to the banning of mobile phones at our site, under most circumstances, at our school. The Mobile Phone Policy was quickly embraced by our site and the change in culture at the school has already been noticeable. We have continued to see the benefit of the new requirements in the improved focus on learning, increased interactions in classes and social engagement in the schoolyard. Family support in meeting this Government requirement is much appreciated.

Secondly, following a successful trial with year 9 students in the last two weeks of term 2 our behaviour support processes are now in place for the whole school. Central to this is our revised Code of Conduct which outlines the expectations of all in our school community. Students who choose not to abide by these expectations will be given opportunities to modify their behaviour prior to them receiving consequences as outlined in our step process. As previously mentioned, all students were given the opportunity to provide feedback as to what was working and what was not at Mount Gambier High School in term 1 this year. It is from this feedback that the ensuing process has been developed. Students and teachers now have clarity as to our expectations which ensures a degree of consistency in our approached to supporting students with their behaviour that contravenes our code. I have personally been extremely happy with the students who have been on our step processes. All of them have accepted responsibility for their actions, have spoken in a decent and dignified manner about the incident and are clear on next steps if they again make poor choices.

This term we also begin course counselling and subject selection for next year. It is a time when students need to work closely with their parents/caregivers and teachers to gather accurate, relevant information on which to base decisions about subjects and future directions.

Subject counselling staff will provide information about SACE, TAFE and Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses to students currently in years 10 and 11. It is important that all students make informed subject choices to keep as many pathways open while completing their studies. As a parent you can assist by carefully reading the soon to be released Curriculum Guide which will be available through our website and encouraging your child to do the same.

Talk with your child about:

- Their interests, particularly regarding subjects
- Their future career and study aspirations
- Their progress in subjects they are doing this year.
- The subjects on offer for next year
- Your ideas about their subject choices
