to catch up. Furthermore, often there is unnecessary pressure placed on the teacher in order to try and catch the student up on work. This can take time away from the remainder of the class.

We will be monitoring and following up patterns of regular lateness to determine the reasons and to establish processes to support the students in order to maximise their learning.

Student Forums

I have had many discussions with students over the term and will continue to do so as the year progresses. Students provide valuable insights as to what it is like to be a learner at Mount Gambier High School and how we can further improve our environment to ensure they are fully supported. Some of the initial student sentiments include:

- No barriers to achieving regardless of background
- Every student's ability and talent recognised and supported through flexible programs
- Outstanding teachers, delivering programs that are recognised across other schools
- A school recognised for its individual student achievements
- People see Mount Gambier High School as an innovative and caring community
- A safe school
- Toilet upgrades
- Greater opportunities for student leadership
- More seating around the school
- More shelter for students
- Consistency of expectations regarding behaviour
- Replacing carpets in classrooms as well as painting them.

We will be conducting further student forums this year to solicit student views on how they believe we have improved over the past 12 months and areas we need to further develop.

Whilst such forums are extremely valuable and will serve to value add to our site's directions, we will not be changing our unrelenting focus on improving in the following focus areas:

- Developing reading comprehension
- Developing numeracy.

However, if our directions are to be authentic, they will need to be owned by all. Research highlights the fact that the sense of community and family contributes 80% to a child's education, with schools, regardless of their geographical location or status, contributing a maximum of only 20%. These figures have always been something we have suspected that the sense of connectedness that our students feel in their communities is vital to their educational and vocational outcomes. It is something we need to nurture and value as a school.

Schools are becoming agencies "of" their communities as opposed to agencies "for" their communities. Community links will be essential if we are to nurture and develop the social and intellectual capital that sustains and adds vibrancy to our community, and we must not lose sight of that important function. This will be an ongoing challenge for us and how we draw upon our local community networks to support students, and their families. Education is different to what we experienced. Our intent however is clear, that is, to become a school recognised for its innovative teaching practices and support programs that assist all students regardless of their background, one that reflects the values and expectations of our community.

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INTERSCHOOL ATHLETICS

On Wednesday 20 March our Athletics team gathered at Marist Park to compete against other local high schools in the 2024 Interschool Athletics. 63 students represented our school with a large number successful in winning more than one event on the day. We also managed to win two relays (Under 16 Boys and Open Boys).

Overall we finished 4th. Of the 124 events, our students placed in the top 3 in 46 events with the team collecting 14 first places, 14 seconds and 18 thirds. STUDENT OFFICE REMINDERS

Student Attendance

Please ensure that the Student Office is notified of student absences or early sign outs. Last Minute Student Collections

There has been an influx of parent/caregiver requests to organise students leaving school within a 10 minute time frame. Whilst we can understand late notice in emergency situations, please be aware that last minute requests to have students removed from class for early collection is not always possible. - Exploration of pathway opportunities spanning all four sectors, encompassing both tertiary and vocational education.
- Examination of the evolving landscape of technology within the industry, notably the rise of automation and advancements in process control.
- Insight into the diverse array of trades within forestry, extending beyond conventional mill trades to encompass vocational pathways in horticulture and biology.

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GLOBAL PERSPECTIVES ACROSS THE TERM

As part of their Global Perspectives studies this term the year 8 students have been learning about landscapes and landforms. They have learned about global landscapes, where these occur and how various landforms are made within them.

In groups, students created dioramas showcasing their understandings. Using their literacy and poetry skills they have also created different examples of poetry about landscapes, including acrostics, haikus and limericks.

In week 8 students were also fortunate enough to undertake a field report excursion to the Naracoorte Caves to observe the karst landscape. The group participated in a walking tour of the Alexandra Cave to observe some of the formations including straws, stalactites and stalagmites, pillars and columns. They also learnt about how caves are dated and formed, what fossils have been found in the caves and how this area gained its World Heritage listing. Students then challenged themselves through an introduction to Adventure Caving in the Stick-Tomato Cave or the Blackberry Cave, crawling and squeezing through challenges such as the keyhole and horseshoe.

Our Star Bear Program

Established in 1999 and operated by the AnglicareSA team since 2002, our Star Bear program looks to increase children's understanding of death and the grieving process.

We believe that it's okay to cry, but it's also okay to have fun and laugh.

And that's why our program of loss and grief support is all about you, sharing your experiences with other children in similar situations – and listening to theirs – in a safe, supportive and inclusive environment.

As one young person told us:

"I knew I wasn't the only one that lost a parent, but I hadn't met anyone else who had, not before camp."

Loss and grief support

Our Star Bear program provides a range of services and activities for both children and their parents, among them:

Grief camps

We offer a selection of free weekend camps for children, young people and their families grieving the death of a parent, sibling or other significant person.

The camps are led by qualified and experienced grief counsellors and supported by trained volunteer mentors.

Before each camp, we host a get-together to give participants a chance to meet and get to know a little about each other.

Camp participants can access short term counselling prior to and following the camp.

We offer two camps:

- the children's camp provides grief support to those aged from six to 13 years
- the family camp caters for families with children and young people aged from four to 17 years and who have lost a close family member.
