SSO Recognition Week

During week 5 we acknowledged the invaluable contributions of our School Support Officers (SSOs), whose roles are integral to the smooth functioning of our school. Our SSOs perform a variety of responsibilities ranging from classroom assistance and specialised intervention programs to administrative support. This dedicated and highly skilled non-teaching team play a pivotal role in supporting students and educators alike, and I extend my

gratitude for their commitment to supporting our school community.

Pupil Free Day

In week 3, our staff engaged in a comprehensive day of professional development, led by the Local Education Team (LET). This event brought together educators and support staff from across the Blue Lake partnership at Wulanda. We were privileged to hear from esteemed speakers, including internationally renowned education expert, Pasi Sahlberg and Department for Education Chief Executive, Martin Westwell. Their insights on the department's new Education Strategy and its future impact on learners were particularly enlightening. The information and thinking shared will further support the implementation of the new strategy at Mount Gambier High School, which is already progressing through the development of the 2025 School Learning Plan (previously known as a Site Improvement Plan).

In the afternoon, non-teaching staff participated in Emotus training, while teaching staff remained at Wulanda to delve into the new SA Curriculum. This curriculum, designed to align with version 9 of the Australian Curriculum, places a strong emphasis on developing dispositions, capabilities, and knowledge. The session provided crucial time for staff collaboration, deepening their understanding of these upcoming changes in preparation for the SA Curriculum's full implementation by 2027.

Pre-Service Teachers

I would like to thank our three pre-service teachers who have been onsite since the commencement of Term 3. Mitchell Jarrett, Totti Partington and Ethan Michielan have observed classes across a variety of learning areas, as well as taking on teaching duties as part of their course. We wish all three the best for the remainder of their studies and look forward to their involvement in education for many years to come.

2025 Student Leadership

Last week students were informed about significant enhancements to the School Captain and Student Representative Council (SRC) selection process. Traditionally, prospective School Captains have nominated themselves and addressed the student body during a whole-school assembly, followed by a popular vote. From 2025, while students will still have the opportunity to nominate and present their candidacies at an assembly, the selection of Captains, Vice-Captains and SRC

PPEP TALK

Applicable year 9 students will be attending a presentation from the Periods, Pains and Endometriosis Program (PPEP) during Impact today.

The PPEP is a jointly funded program by the Federal and State Governments and is part of the National Action Plan for Endometriosis and an initiative of the Pelvic Pain Foundation of Australia. They are dedicated to helping young people manage their pain so that they can live to their full potential.

It includes discussion around normal menstruation, how to recognise when symptoms are abnormal, simple ways to improve symptoms and when to look further for help.

What is discussed?

- Brief recap of pelvic anatomy and periods
- The five different types of pelvic pain someone may be feeling and easy strategies to reduce this pain i.e. medication (anti-inflammatories), hormone options (OCP's, Implants and IUD's), the role of pelvic muscles (stretching, heat and movement), diet, exercise, sleep, cycle tracking, positive experiences and complementary therapies.
- Neuroscience of pain
- Endometriosis how common it is (one in nine people assigned female at birth), how to recognise when someone has it and how to treat it.
- Where/how to get further support and our Next Steps sessions for families of students with pelvic pain.

SCIENCE & ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

On Thursday 15 August, 22 students from year 8 to year 10 participated in the annual Science and Engineering Challenge at Wulanda. This event, organised by the University of Newcastle and supported by the Rotary Clubs of Mount Gambier, featured a variety of engaging activities.

Throughout the day students tackled eight different challenges: Confounding Communications, Job Juggle, Helter Skelter Shelter, Flight, ElectraCITY, Fish Traps, Wind Turbine, and Bridge. Year 8 student Torah shared, "It was really fun and I particularly enjoyed the Wind Turbine activity." Meanwhile, year 10 student Slater remarked, "I liked the ElectraCITY activity because it allowed me to use my brain to strategise how to get electricity to different nodes."

The day concluded with a bridge-testing competition. Our Mount Gambier High School team, consisting of Logan, Jasper, Rizki, and Fletcher, built a bridge that weighed 95 grams. It successfully passed the initial tests with the trolley rolling over it and even managed to hold up to three additional weights. However, the bridge couldn't withstand the 4.5 kg super ingot and eventually crumpled under the pressure.

Year 9 student James commented, "It was very eventful. The challenges were really fun and it was a great day." The students were praised for their enthusiasm and respectful behaviour throughout the event. A notable achievement was our morning groups for Helter Skelter Shelter and Job Juggle, securing second place.

NAIDOC WEEK AND FAREWELLING KATHY BECK

On Monday 5 August we held a whole school assembly to recognise and celebrate NAIDOC Week (which fell during the term 2 school holidays, 7-14 July). NAIDOC Week celebrates and recognises the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

This year's theme chosen by the National NAIDOC Committee was 'Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud and Proud'. The theme honours the enduring strength and vitality of First Nations culture - with fire a symbol of connection to Country, to each other, and to the rich tapestry of traditions that define Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Our Aboriginal Education Coordinator, Chelsea Whitfield shared a meaningful speech, recognising the history and significance of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People in Australia.

We also took the opportunity to formally farewell and thank Kathy Beck who has served and supported ATSI families at Mount Gambier High School for many years. In recognition of Kathy's enormous contribution to the Mount Gambier High School community we were delighted to announce that our Murapena Room will now be known as the 'Kathy Beck Murapena Room'! Kathy's legacy will now be formally etched into the history of Mount Gambier High School.

Following the assembly, staff gathered for a shared lunch to celebrate Kathy's retirement.

SAPOL ROAD SAFETY SESSION

In week 3 of term 3, Nick, a Police Officer from SAPOL's Road Safety section, delivered presentations to year 10 and year 12 students.

Nick first addressed the year 10 cohort, covering essential topics related to obtaining a driver's license and road safety. His presentation included details about the Graduated Licensing Scheme, including the process for acquiring L's and P's, and the importance of maintaining a log book. He also explained the Fatal Five: speeding, drug and alcohol use, distractions, and unsafe driving. The session highlighted crash statistics, the differences between country and city accidents, ANCAP safety ratings, and why avoiding old cars is advisable. Students were particularly interested in the car crash images and the impact of road accidents. Year 10 student Bailey noted, "Presentations like this are important as we start getting our L's. It is a good reminder to do the right thing on the road."

In the second session, Nick spoke to a smaller group of year 12 students. He shared his career journey into the road safety division and focused on road safety issues relevant to P1 and P2 license holders. The discussion covered road trauma, license conditions and the progression from P1 to P2, and then to a full license. The students engaged actively in the Q&A session. Year 12 student Milly commented, "It clarified rules for us P Platers and reminded us to be safe while driving."

Nick also revisited the Fatal Five, presenting case studies and statistics showing that 494 lives were lost between 2019 and 2023, with distractions being the leading cause. Year 12 student Harry Martin said, "The statistics about how many Australians are affected each year and their stories were touching and highlighted a serious issue."

We appreciate Nick's efforts in delivering these informative sessions, which left students engaged and more aware of road safety.

Mikayla provided an overview of Deakin's campuses, courses and options, including online study, degrees, the Work Integrated Learning Program, the Deakin Talent Graduate Employment Program, and the Deakin Accelerate Extension Studies Program. She also highlighted university life aspects, such as involvement in clubs, sports, health services, student advisors, tutoring, and financial aid.


Key points of Mikayla's presentation included:

- Start early.
- Do your research.
- Understand the ATAR.
- Know entry requirements.
- Check access schemes.
- Create preference lists.
- Ask questions.

Mikayla emphasised that there are multiple pathways to university, including various schemes, scholarships and HECS support.

The presentation was a valuable opportunity for students to consider their future university options. Year 11 student Thalia Von Stanke commented, "After the talk with Deakin, I am inspired to aim for a high ATAR to attend university."
